18		Street and Jefferson Boulevard(SOUND: DOOR OPEN)

20	SOUND:	THEY WALK INTO MARKET. WE HEAR LITTLE CONFUSION OF PEOPLE
21		AS THEY GATHER AROUND LARRY
22	LARRY:	(FADING IN) No, I guess I should have been scared. Way
23		they came in with those guns. But I wasn't. That one
24		came back into the office and said he wanted the money.
25		I gave it to him. I wasn't gonna mess with him.
26	SOUND:	JOE AND FRANK REACH LARRY AND STOP

1 JOE: Mr. Haskins?

2 LARRY: Yes, I'm Haskins. Who're you?

3 JOE: Police officers, sir. My name's Friday. This is my

4 partner, Frank Smith.

5 LARRY: Friday and Smith, huh? Yeah. You the fellas they was

6 talkin' about buh?

7 JOE: Sir?

8 LARRY: The other ones. Cops in the car. They said there'd be a

Then I started checking out the weeks 10 reciepts. 11 JOE: Uh huh. 12 LARRY: Well, then like I said, it must have been 8:45 or so 13 when I hear this knock on the door, I knew that is must 14 be something wrong. The employees know not to bother 15 me when I'm makin' up the deposit alips. 16 FRANK: Yes sir. 17 LARRY: That's when I knew that something was wrong. Right 18 away, I said to myself, Larry....there's somethin' up. 19 Something that isn't good. 20 JOE: Yes sir.

11:05 A.M. Frank and I checked with the officers in the 1 JOE: 2 radio unit that had answered the call. They'd gotten out 3 a broadcast on the bandits, and then started a canvas Ϋ́ of the neighborhood but they didn't find anyone who could give any informatiom. One of the clerks was 5 5 able to describe the smaller of the two suspects. We 7 got about a local and an A.P.B. on them and then we took 3 the market manager downtown to look at the mugg books. He'd told us that the larger man had worn gloves all 9 the time he was in the store so there was no need to 20 look for fingerprints. The market bandits had been 11 13 operating for the past eight months. In that time 15 they'd held up 17 stores. Their method of operation 1/2 always was the same. They'd hit only after a weekend 1.5 or on the Monday following a holiday weekend. 15 hit only the larger supermarkets of the ranch type. Their operations had taken them all over the southland. 17 33 We'd tried to stake the markets that might be hit but 3.9 their field of operations had been so wide that is was 20 impossible. 2:15 PM the market manager, Larry 21 Haskins started on the 6th mugg book. 22 LARRY: Sure a lot of 'em. 23 JOE: Yes sir. 24 LARRY: All these fellas. They all comitted some crime huh? 25 JOE: Yes sir. that's right.

JOE: We checked on the rest home. It was a private 2 sanitarium in the valley. We got in touch with the 3 medical authorities and found that the head of the 4 hospital was listed as Dr. James Korby. Frank and I drove out and talked to Doctor Korby and the rest of the 5 6 staff. From them we got the story that Hanson had been a resident of the home for the past four months. We 7 8 found that he had a lung ailment and was confined to his 9 bed 24 hours a day. The doctor showed us his records and 10 charts. From what we could tell it would have been 11 impossible for Hanson to have been the bandit. Three weeks passed. On August 4th, the market thieves hit 12 13 again, this time out in East Los Angeles. They got away 14 with a little over 9 thousand dollars. The manager of the market came downtown and checked the mugg books. 15 16 They again identified Hanson as the thief. We had the staats office make another run on the M.O. used. The 17 18 result came back and out of the thousands of cards 19 checked only one fitting the robbery had been handled, Hanson's. We called the rest home and found that on the 20 21 of the stick up, the suspect hadn't left his bed. 22 Another month passed. During that time, we ran down all leads. Informants were questioned but they could tell 23 us nothing. Apparently, the hold up men were hitting 24 25 and then dropping completely out of sight until they 26 hit again. - No big deposits lately.
- 18 JOE: You check the A.M.A. on him?
- 19 FRANK: Yeah. He's not a member. They haven't got anything on
- 19A him.
- 20 JOE: How 'bout the rest of the staff?
- 21 FRANK: Seem to be okay. Two of the nurses have been there for
- over two years. The male nurse was hired about 5 months
- 23 ago.
- 24 JOE: That'd be just before Hanson got there.
- 25 FRANK: Yeah.

2 FRANK:	Isn't any. Not a thing on him in the files. Nothin'

1 JOE: At 8:01 A.M. that morning, a pair of holdup men had 2 walked a market out on Adams Boulevard and robbed the 3 place of a little under 11 thousand dollars. The 4 manager gave us a description of the holdup men. One 5 was large, dark and had a small scar over the bridge of 6 his nose. The other was small, sandy haired and had no 7 visable marks of scars. We showed the manager mugg shots 8 of Hanson and he positively identified him as the larger 9 of the two men. A local and A.P.B. was gotten out on the 10 pair and then Frank and I drove out to the hospital in 11 the valley. 8:46 A.M. we talked with Doctor Korby. I know you men are trying to do your duty. But I've told 12 JAMES: you before, it couldn't possible be Mr. Hanson. I know 13 14 for a fact that he hasn't been out of his bed this 15 morning. Is it possible for him to get out of his room without 16 JOE: 17 you knowing it? 18 JAMES: No. Wonder if we could see him Doctor? 19 FRANK: 20 JAMES: No. I don't think that would be possible. He's still asleep and I can't have him disturbed. 21 You're sure though that he couldn't have left the 22 FRANK: 23 hospital without your knowing it?

- 1 JAMES: Absolutely. No chance of it.
- 2 JOE: What time does Hanson generally wake up Doctor?
- 3 JAMES: Depends. Usually though I'd say he's awake by 9:30 or so.
- 4 JOE: Wonder if we could wait and talk to him?
- 5 JAMES: If you like. I'll tell one of the nurses to call you
- 6 when he's awake.
- 7 JOE: Alright sir...that'd be fine.
- 8 JAMES: One thing though I must insist on.
- 9 JOE: What's that Doctor?
- 10 JAMES: He must not be excited. I don't think you gentlemen
- ll really know how ill Mr. Hanson is. If you had any idea
- you wouldn't be out here with this rediculous questioning.
- 13 JOE: Yes sir. We understand, but we're just trying to get
- 14 this thing straightened out.
- 15 JAMES: Fine. I'll go along with you part of the way but I will
- not have my patient disturbed. Any excitement would be
- 17 very bad for him.
- 18 JOE: Don't worry Doctor..., we'll be as brief as possible.
- 19 JAMES: Fine. If you'll excuse me now. I've got some things to
- do. I'll tell the nurse to call you when he wakes up.
- 21 SOUND: JAMES WALKS TO DOOR AND OPENS IT

JOE: 9:30 A.M., we called the office and two more teams of men 2 came out to help us search the place. Hamson was not on the grounds of the hospital. In his room we found several 3 4 floorplan drawings of markets that had been robbed. The 5 drawings showed the location of the managers office and of 6 the safe. Along with the drawings, we found several maps 7 with roads marked on them leading back to the hospital. A 8 stakeout was placed on the rest home in the event that the 9 suspect returned and Frank and I drove the doctor back 10 downtown. We talked to him for an hour before he finally 11 told us the story. He said that Hanson had come to him and offered him money to say that he was ill and give him a room. 12 The doctor went on to say that after he got started he tried 13 14 to get out of the deal but that Hanson said he'd get his 15 family if the doctor said anything about his activities to 16 the police. Dr. Korby gave us the name of Hanson's 17 accomplice, Marty Peterson. He said that he didn't know 18 where Peterson lived but that he usually came out a couple 19 of times a week to see Hanson. We notified the stakeout to be on the lookout for Peterson and then we booked Dr. Korby 20 at the main jail. We ran the name Marty Peterson through 21 22 R. and I. but got no make. We sent the name to George Brerton, C.I.I. at Sacramento and also to Washington. The 23 kickback gave Peterson a record of 2 arrests of robbery and 24 one for A.D.W. in the East. It also gave the name of a 25 26 a sister who lived in Los Angeles. We checked with her and and she was able to tell us where Peterson lived. Thursday, 27 October 30. Frank and I drove out to his apartment.

We took Marty Hanson down to the city hall and 1 JOE: fingerprinted him and then he was booked at the Main 2 Jail. Before he was booked, he gave us the address of 3 4 Hanson's girl friend. Frank and I drove over and talked to her. She told us that she hadn't seen the suspect 5 for several weeks. She said that she had heard that 6 Hanson had been running around with another girl. 7 also told us that she'd heard Hanson had bought a new 8 car and was running around with a new bunch of friends. 9 10. She said that she hadn't seen him since he got the new car but said that she heard it was a new Oldsmobile and 11 was painted a fire engine red. We called the office and 12 arranged for a stakeout on her apartment and then we 13 began to check out the Oldsmobile dealers in the Los 14 15 Angeles area. Two teams of men were assigned to help us in running down the list. It took us two days to 16 talk to the dealers in town. Each of the dealers was 17 shown a mugg shot of Hanson. Two days went by. Finally 18 we got an identification. A dealer out on Franklin in 19 Hollywood reported that he's sold a car to a man 20 answering Hanson's description. However when we checked 21 the address he gave us we found that Hanson had moved a 22 week before and left no forwarding address. We got in 23 touch with the Department of Motor Vehicles and from them 24 we got the address where they'd sent the pink slip. It 25 was an apartment house out on Highland Avenue. 26 and I went out to check it out. 27
